GOOD SPORT! - by Bev Watson

All my life I've been very competitive and a little contrary, but that has served me well. I've learned there's really nothing you can't do or learn if you find out what it takes, then break it down in tiny steps and go for it.

So my life has been full of all kinds of interesting challenges and adventures. But here I want to talk about cancer and how Wellspring Calgary has helped me.

I had been a triathlete for 15 years when I won the 2013 World Championship Ironman in Hawaii. After that, biking and swimming started getting hard. I kept pushing myself, but something didn't feel right.

I went to the doctor but tests showed nothing was wrong. I started losing my balance when I was walking or swimming, but I kept training.

I went in to see my dermatologist about another issue and when I told him my symptoms, he said he thought I might have a brain tumour. At his insistence, I went to Rockyview Hospital. They did a CT scan and saw a big dark spot, so they ordered an MRI. They took one look at the results and I was ambulanced to Foothills Hospital.

It took a while to get the diagnosis. Brain tumour – malignant. Metastatic melanoma. I had brain surgery and vigorous treatment. I was told I had months, then weeks to live. That was two years ago, and I'm still here.



I'm here and I still have things to do. I go to Wellspring Calgary several times a week. They have all kinds of programs - free for people with cancer. Everyone is so caring and welcoming there. It doesn't matter how bad you are at painting, or playing ukulele, you are always encouraged. If you have cancer – find Wellspring – it's a life-saver!

GLENMORE DAM UPGRADES

he Glenmore Dam has been key part of Calgary's water infrastructure system since the early 1930's. The wear and tear the dam has experienced over 85 years of service, and the ever increasing demands of a growing city, mean the time has come for an extensive upgrade. These improvements will not only extend the life of the dam, but will help manage our drinking water supply and give us the ability to better control low and high river flows.

The first phase of the Glenmore Dam Infrastructure Improvements Program was the Utilities Relocation Project. This project involved moving the water and gas utility lines currently running across the top of the dam to a new tunnel excavated underneath the Elbow River. This is needed to allow access to the dam while upgrades are being made, which include a new bridge deck with better access for maintenance and pathway users, concrete work on the face of the dam, and a new steel gate and hoist system.

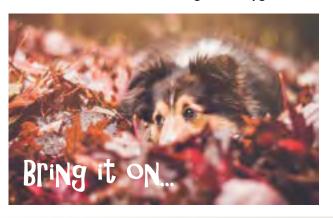
While the normal maximum operating levels of the reservoir remains the same, the new gate system will provide greater flexibility to manage reservoir storage during low flows in the winter and high flows in the spring.

The pathway across the dam was closed to the public on September 30, 2017, and then until the work is complete in

2020. Pathway detours will be implemented during this time and signage will be available to assist pathway users. (Up to date information on pathway closures, including maps, is available at calgary.ca/pathwayclosures.)

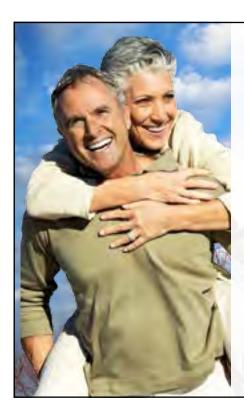

OLD AGE SECURITY: NOW OR LATER?

If you meet the eligibility requirements, you can start collecting Old Age Security (OAS) benefits as soon as you turn 65. But did you know that you don't have to take them then? You can delay getting your benefits by up to five years and increase your payments by up to 36%.

- Earn higher monthly payments. For each month beyond age 65 that you delay receiving OAS, your payments will go up by 0.6%. 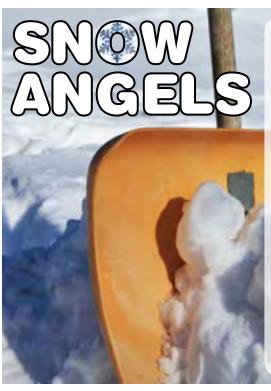

BENEFITS OF SNOW ANGELS

- I. People who are less mobile may fear losing the homes they love or having to leave the communities they've lived in for years if they are unable to keep their sidewalks clear. By removing snow for neighbours, you may be able to help them feel secure staying in their homes.
- 2. Paramedics experience a dramatic increase in heart-related calls after heavy snowfalls. Cold air

- and heavy lifting can cause strain on the heart which leads to cardiac distress, especially for the elderly or those with physical ailments.
- 3. Social isolation can contribute to a low quality of life. For some, daily interactions with Snow Angels provide a source of community inclusion and pride.
- 4. Neighbours who know each other are less likely to be victims of crime as people look out for those they know.

Remember residents have just 24 hours after a snow fall to remove snow from sidewalks adjacent to their property.

Tips for using your blue, green and black carts

Now that Calgarians are able to recycle and compost all year-long, it's important to put items in the right carts. Here are a few tips to follow:

GREEN CART

- Every little bit counts! Plate scrapings, fruit pits, bones, egg shells and sauces can all be composted.
- Is your green cart full? Put extra leaves and branches into paper yard waste bags. Roll closed and place at least I ft. to the side of your green cart on collection day.

BLUE CART

- Remember to bag your plastic bags! All plastic grocery bags, bread bags, sandwich bags and plastic wrap need to be put in one bag and tied closed before recycling.
- Is your blue cart full? Make sure to break down all boxes to make room or take extras to a community recycling depot.

BLACK CART

- If an item can't be recycled or composted, then it has reached its end-of-life and belongs in the garbage. This includes chip bags, granola wrappers, foam packaging, and dryer lint.
- Is your black cart full? You can put out extra garbage bags by placing at least 1 ft. to the side of your black cart on collection day.

FOOD & YARD WASTE

Live in an apartment, condo or townhouse? It's time to keep your food and yard waste out of the garbage. As of November 1, 2017, all multifamily complexes in Calgary are required to separate food and yard waste from the garbage for composting or diversion. Your building owner or manager is responsible for setting up a food and yard waste program in your complex – ask them how it works.

Businesses and organizations are also now required to separate food and yard waste from the garbage. Look for the food waste bin at your workplace, food court or favourite coffee shop. If your multi-family complex or workplace does not offer a food and yard waste program, you can contact 311 for support.

Food and yard waste makes up nearly 40 per cent of garbage from apartments, condos and townhouses, and over 30 per cent from businesses and organizations. Composting will create a useful new product and keep this material out of the landfill.

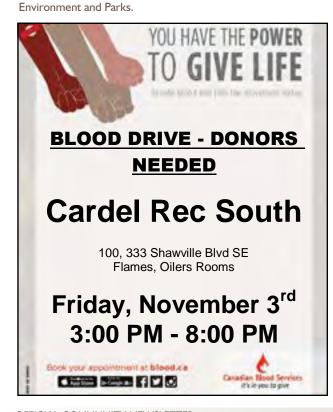

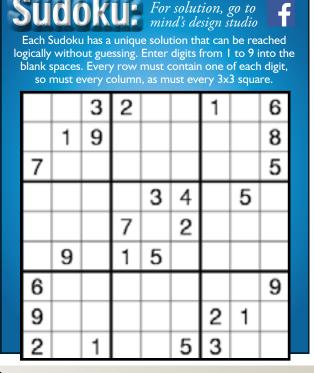

AB STUDENTS & THE OPIOID CRISIS:

People across the province tell me that it is crucial for age appropriate information be taught about the opioid overdose crisis in the AB curriculum. A recent story from BC examined what resources are available within schools to teach students about their crisis: but there was no information on AB-which underlined the need for a comprehensive strategy to teach students the dangers of opioids—at age appropriate levels. As United Conservative Advocate for Education, Post-Secondary Education, Indigenous Relations, and Wellness, I fully support immediately investigating the implementation of curriculum on the drug crisis. My colleagues and I believe our school system must be a safe space for students to learn about the dangers of the opioid crisis that AB continues to grapple with. If providing information within the school setting on the dangers of fentanyl can save even one life, it's worth it. Our caucus proposes that the Gov't collaborate with health, education, and law enforcement professionals, along with other provinces, to develop

modules on the opioid epidemic...while ensuring harm-reduction, prevention, and awareness initiatives are taught. The more information students are equipped with, the more likely they are to understand the lethal nature of fentanyl and other opioids. It's a life and death issue.

CONNECTIONS WITH ALBERTA FAMILIES:

Constituents continue to tell me that as AB families went back to school this fall. the disconnect between Gov't policies and the harmful effect on students and parents is becoming more and more apparent. Worried parents have been left grappling with the consequences of Bill I-with families bracing for far-away bus stops, terrible commutes, and uncertainty around programs of choice. Many students are dealing with the consequences of Gov't policy-with some travelling on half a dozen different busses a day-just to get to and from school. When Bill I was introduced in the Legislature this spring, I warned Gov't about the impact it would have on families every day. Coupled with the extra carbon tax costs, many families are in very difficult situations. Our caucus

continues to hear loud and clear from AB families who say they are worse off under these policies; and that if the Gov't was listening, they would stop introducing policies that are hurting students and their families.
