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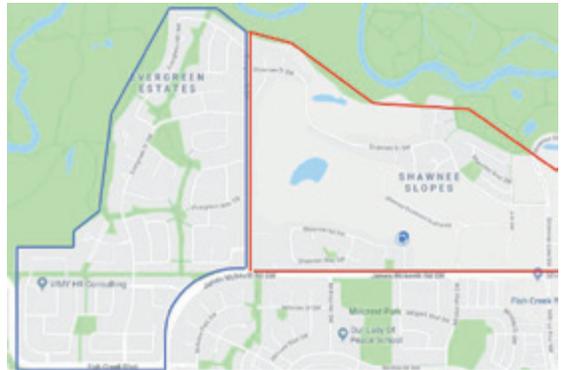

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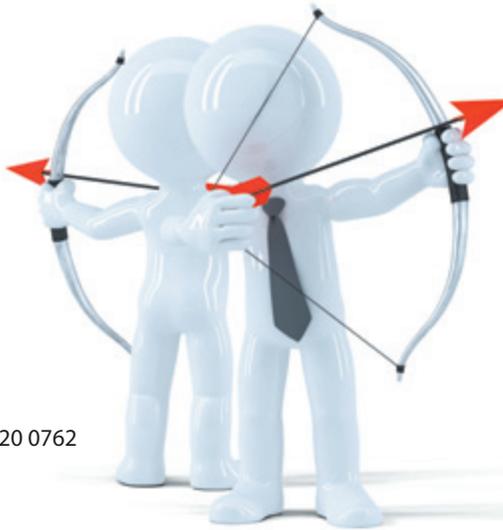
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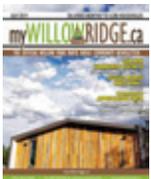

Phishing and Email Safety

“Phishing” is an online safety concern that involves fake emails (or spam) written to appear as if they have been sent by a genuine organization (for example, a bank) with the intent of luring the recipient into revealing sensitive and confidential information such as usernames, passwords, account credentials, personal identifying numbers (PIN) or credit card details. Typically, phishing attacks will direct the recipient to a webpage to get the user’s personal information.

Phishing can lead to financial losses, identity theft or viruses on your computer.

Reporting Phishing Attacks

If you’ve received a phishing email, take these steps to protect yourself and others:

- Contact the company that was being impersonated to learn if they are alerting others of phishing scams and inform them of the incident. Report the incident to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (Toll Free at 1-888-495-8501) and to the Anti-Phishing Working Group (APWG).

If you did not provide personal information to the scam, delete the email. If you did provide person information, take these subsequent steps:

1. Contact your bank or credit card company if any of your financial information was used.
2. File a complaint with the Calgary Police Service by calling 403-266-1234 and obtain a police case number.
3. Give your police case number to your bank and credit card company to place on file.
4. Provide the police case number to either of the two credit bureau companies, Equifax or TransUnion in Canada.

5. Report the phishing to the groups above if you haven’t done so already.
6. Run an anti-virus scan on your computer.
7. Check your e-commerce accounts. For example, PayPal, Ebay and Amazon.
8. Tell your friends and family to be wary of suspicious emails from you.
9. Change your passwords.

How Do I Prevent Phishing Attacks?

1. Use your best judgment when on the internet. Listen to your intuition. Stop and think before sending personal information to anyone over the Internet or phone.
2. Delete email messages that ask for personal or financial information.
3. Remember that, no matter how real the email looks, no legitimate company will ask for personal information through email. If in doubt, find the phone number of the company from their official website; don’t trust any phone numbers provided in the email.
4. Be suspicious of emails with spelling mistakes, grammatical errors or inconsistencies.
5. Be wary of emails that begin with “Dear valued customer” or use words to evoke a sense of urgency or emotion.
6. Review online safety as well as email scams and safety for more information on protecting yourself online

How to Tell If You’re a Victim of a Phishing Attack

The following are possible signs that your computer may have been compromised by phishing or a virus:

- Your computer runs more slowly than normal or behaves strangely. For example, it makes unexpected sounds, has lots of error messages or shows changes in files or folders.
- It freezes frequently, runs slowly or completely stops responding.
- Computer applications do not work properly.
- Disk drives may be inaccessible or start unexpectedly.
- There are unusual or unexpected error messages, images, distorted menus and dialog boxes.
- Your contacts may tell you that they have received email messages from your address, but you haven’t sent them anything.
- Your personal firewall may advise you that an application has tried to connect to the Internet although it is not a program that you are running.

Changing One's Tune:

The Evolution of the Siren

February has Valentine's Day, and Valentine's Day means romance. So, I'm taking that a step further and going to be talking about creatures of seduction: sirens. Sirens in our contemporary imaginations are more or less mermaids whose voices allure people to their deaths. But it didn't start that way. Once upon a time, sirens were actually bird women.

In the *Odyssey*, Odysseus encounters the sirens on his journey home. To recap: Odysseus commands his crew to tie him to the ship's mast because he is curious about the sirens' song. He orders the crew to fill their ears with wax and not to loose him until they had sailed beyond the sirens' voices. Beyond the sirens' irresistible song, not much else is described. Scholars have suggested that it is because the audience already knew what sirens were and did not need to be reminded. But surviving images and literature from the period depict sirens as bird-like creatures with women's faces. This later evolved into women with bird legs—sometimes with or without wings on their backs—holding musical instruments. At some point, all bird attributes disappeared, and they looked like human women, set apart only by their bewitching voices.

So how did we go from bird people to fish people? That's a bit muddled. One source said that in Isidore of Seville's *Etymologies* (c. 615 A.D. – 630 A.D.), he wrote that in addition to feathered sirens, there were also winged serpents in Arabia called sirens. It is possible that a snake/woman hybrid emerged which was either changed to or confused with half-fish. As sirens are associated with oceans and seafaring, it would make sense for a half-woman, half-snake to be mistaken as half-woman, half-sea-serpent/fish.

There were once depictions of male sirens too, but they seemed to have been phased out around the 5th century B.C., which I think is unfortunate. I don't see male sirens being any less appealing than female sirens. I'm a sucker for a baritone as it is. Given that sirens are *not* the same as mermaids, I'm also arguing that male sirens are not the same as mermen. And I think male sirens should be brought back. #Feminism (and I only mean that half-jokingly).

Beyond seducing sailors, sirens had function within the Greek cosmology. Proclus, a contemporary of Plato, relayed that Plato had divided sirens into three categories: celestial, generative, and purificatory/cathartic. Celestial sirens were under the authority of Zeus, while generative

sirens were under Poseidon; purificatory/cathartic sirens served Hades. The surviving sources seem to associate them more with the latter, as Ovid wrote that sirens were companions of Persephone, Hades' wife. There are two versions of why this is: one is that Persephone's mother, Demeter, gave the sirens wings to help them search for her daughter, then kidnapped by Hades. The other version is that Demeter cursed the sirens to be the winged, singing seductresses because they failed to stop the abduction. Hyginus wrote that sirens would only live as long as those who were trapped in their songs remained ensnared. If they escaped, the sirens would die.

On a tangentially related note, the word siren, used in reference to a police or ambulance siren, was first recorded in 1879. But how we got from "hypnotically beautiful singing" to "obnoxious cacophony" is an article for a different time.

Here's some free advice: if your Tinder date has a beautiful voice from which you can't seem to pull yourself away, plays a lyre, seems fishy or perhaps likes birds a little too much, maybe don't fight your friends when they tie you to a ship's mast until that 'relationship' has sailed. Happy Valentine's Day.

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Making Positive Steps Toward Your Health Goals

To make a change, use goals to chart your path to success. Two types of goals can help you do this: long-term and short-term.

Don't forget to write down your goals. They may change, but you'll want a record. Writing them down is a great way to start your plan to improve your health.

No matter what your health goal is, creating a specific plan can help you succeed. Follow the steps below to create your plan. This will put you on a path toward meeting your goal. With the help of goals, you can go as far as you want!

Step 1: Know your reason.

Why is this change important to you? Make sure it's something that you really want to do.

Step 2: Set a specific long-term goal.

A long-term goal is not something you can do all at once. It's the goal that inspires you and that will show how far you've come when you complete it. It's usually a goal you hope to reach in six months or a year.

A long-term goal could be to walk for one hour, three times a week. To keep going, think how proud you'll be when you reach this goal.

When you reach your long-term goal, you can keep things fresh by setting new goals.

What is a long-term goal that you can reach in about six to 12 months?

Step 3: Set your short-term goals. Short-term goals help you accomplish your long-term goal. They keep you going day to day. They are usually goals you hope to reach tomorrow or next week.

One example would be to start using the stairs at work, or to take one 10-minute walk and build up to walking three times a week. Short-term goals should be easy to do and will grow as you make progress.

How can you create short-term goals that you take week by week to reach your long-term goal?

Step 4: Prepare for slip-ups or setbacks. What might get in the way of your reaching this goal? You may already know that things like time, money, or emotions could get in the way. How might you get around these things?

Step 5: Plan for support and rewards. Who can help you meet your goals? Maybe friends, family, or a support group? And how will you reward yourself? A movie, a special meal, an hour to yourself can be a treat.

Step 6: See your success. How will your life be different after you make this change?
