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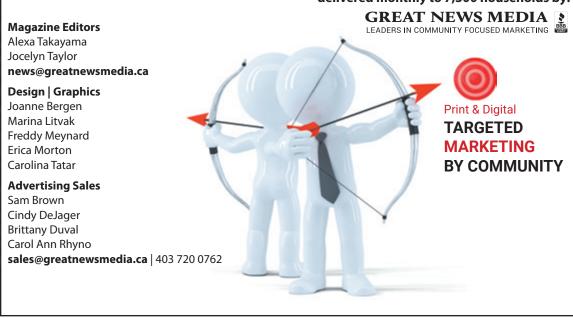

Traffic Around Schools

There is still a lot of concern with the way people are driving around the schools. Slowdown, make sure your kids cross safely, do not stop on Fish Creek Blvd., no Uturns, etc. If you are unsure where the proper drop off and pick up area is, please contact your school. I have contacted our CPS representatives to monitor the situations around the schools in the morning and around pick up times more often. Please also keep in mind that Evergreen is being used as a shortcut to get to 37th St. by people outside of our community. There is increased traffic and speed, so be mindful of this and stay safe. We are doing what we can to mitigate the traffic.

Slowdown in playground zones!

This time of year is when daylight starts lasting a little bit longer. I ask everyone to be safe when driving in the playground zones and watch out for one another. Please be safe around the school buses, watch for kids, no U-turns and be mindful of the people living nearby. They are your neighbours, be courteous. Playground zones are in effect till 9pm.

Fish Creek Blvd

Did you know that the majority of Fish Creek Blvd is a 50 km/hr zone? It only becomes a 60 km/hr zone when you are travelling west and have past most of the condos on the north side.

Would you like to see a permanent rink developed in Evergreen? Would you like to see Evergreen Community Association events continue?

Then we need you!

The Evergreen Community Association has put together a committee for helping raise funds and revenue for the community and it needs your help to fill them.

Tips for Growing Vegetables in Calgary Gardens

Donna Balzer, co-author of No Guff Vegetable Gardening, shares her advice for growing a successful veggie patch in Calgary.

When you plant matters

Different plants are better planted at different times. Kale, Swiss chard, and garlic can withstand frost, and so can be planted as early as late March. "If they're a very root-hardy plant, like lettuce, spinach or garlic, you can put those in early," says Balzer. Other veggies, like zucchini, require guaranteed warm weather in order to grow, and are best planted at a time when warm weather abounds like early June.

Grow what you wouldn't buy

A big reason people grow their own vegetables is to have healthier food options. Balzer suggests keeping in mind which pesticide-laden or disease-prone foods they can avoid in the grocery store by growing their own.

"Spinach for example, is often on a recall list in the States. It's often dirty," says Balzer. "Why spinach? It is so easy to grow in the off-season in warmer areas, but they don't have the water quality that we have here in Calgary. We're better to grow our own spinach."

Potatoes are another good example of what to grow rather than buy, says Balzer, as commercially grown potatoes use a lot of pesticides.

Grow your own and start indoors

If you're going to start gardening, you should start

growing your plants indoors rather than buying pregrown plants from a greenhouse, says Balzer.

"If you buy a plant that's been grown in a greenhouse, it's super lush, super big and super root bound. You might have trouble acclimatizing it to outdoors," she says. "If you start it yourself in the right soil at the right time, you'll have it at the right stage at the right time to start it outside."

When to transplant depends on the type of vegetable you're growing.

Spacing is key

No matter your garden size, the amount of space you have to work with is ultimately limited. Balzer suggests plotting out the amount of space available to you and designating which vegetables will go where in order to maximize your crop.

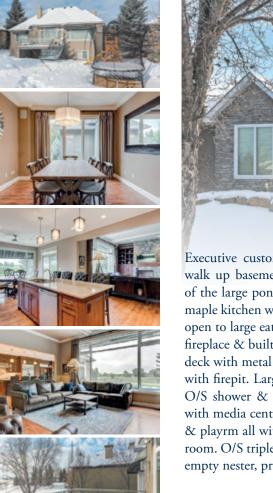
"I can tell you that one cauliflower takes up the same space as 50 carrots," she says.

Not planting all your seeds at once is another important element of spacing your garden. "Stagger when you start plants. Who wants 3,000 radishes all at once?" says Balzer. "People get a package of seeds and they put in that whole package. They realize quickly that they are giving them away or never get through them all."

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Bridlewood Wetlands

Bridlewood Wetlands Park occupies about six hectares of the Bridlewood Creek Community in the southwest part of the city. The wetland was named after the community which was developed in 1997.

Experience nature in the city

The surrounding community is a prime example of how suburban development can be integrated with nature. This wetland is part of the water management system and the surrounding homeowners not only paid a premium to live by the marsh, but they signed an agreement not to use pesticides, herbicides and synthetic fertilizers.

Plant life

The boardwalk provides a good opportunity to view aquatic vegetation such as Common Cattails and Bulrushes and the many species of invertebrates that are found in and around a marsh.

Wildlife

The wetlands are home to several species of dabbling waterfowl including the usual Mallards and Bluewinged Teal but also Canvasbacks, Northern Pintails and Ruddy Ducks. Red-winged Blackbirds and the much less common Yellow-headed Blackbird are also found regularly in the wetland.

History

These wetlands are part of a natural chain that has proven to be a challenge to residential developers. In this case, rather than drain the wetlands and build over them, the wetlands were modified and built into the water processing system for the community. There is an upper drainage settling pond and then the water is released into the marshland. Tucked in the corner of the wetland is the huge glacial erratic that was transported here from Mount Edith Cavell by the glacier.

MUSKRAT BEHAVIOR

Activity: Muskrats are active year-round, and they feed at all times of the day. They are most active at twilight.

Reproduction: Females give birth to 2-3 litters per year, each time yielding an average of 4-8 pups. The size of the litters varies with the seasons, with larger litters being born in spring and summer, and small litters being born in winter. In warmer months, muskrats can give birth to as many as 15 young at once. Newborn muskrats are weaned for about a year before they become independent.

Feeding: Muskrats gather food within their territories and carry it to feeding platforms on which they eat. These feeding platforms are flat, elevated piles of mud and vegetation, which muskrats construct outside of their living dens.

Social Interaction: As monogamous breeders, muskrats live with their mates and their young. They are very territorial, especially during breeding season.

Fun Facts about Muskrats:

- Muskrats are excellent swimmers, thanks to their webbed back feet, laterally flattened tails, and the ability to hold their breath underwater for 15-20 minutes. They can swim backwards and forwards.
- Most of the time muskrats mate underwater.
- Muskrat kits are born hairless and blind.
- Known to be most valuable for their fur or pelts, muskrats are one of the most trapped animals in history.
- Muskrats play important roles in certain ecological systems, as their eating and denning habits create the ideal flat nesting areas for certain birds.

10 Tips to Recycle Right in 2020

Create new recycling habits for the new year – this is one resolution you'll want to keep!

- Bookmark the What Goes Where search tool on your computer/ smartphone. Visit calgary.ca/ whatgoeswhere to find out what to recycle, compost or dispose of.
- 2. Know what <u>not</u> to put in your Blue Cart. Batteries, loose plastic bags, clothing, food and liquid, garden hoses, electrical cords, Styrofoam, needles and yard waste do not belong in the recycling.
- 3. Group your bins together. Make it easy for anyone in your house to recycle – just as easy as it is to throw something away. Put your inside recycling bin next to your garbage can. For extra credit, add extra recycling and composting bins in your kitchens, bathrooms, and laundry room. Most of your home's recyclables and compostables come from these three rooms.
- 4. Empty, clean and dry. Before you toss your empty containers, cans, jars, bottles, and cartons, make sure you rinse out liquids, food residue and such then put these containers in your blue bin.
- 5. Keep electronics and batteries out of the recycling cart. While these should be recycled, batteries and electronics do not belong in your curbside recycling bin. These items can start fires at recycling facilities and in the garbage trucks. Visit calgary.ca/whatgoeswhere to know where to safely recycle or dispose of electronics and batteries.

- 6. Bag your bags. Make it easier to bag your bags by setting up a spot in your home to collect them together. Hang a bag off a hook inside a cabinet or clip a bag off the side of your indoor recycling bin. Fill the bag up with all your stretchy bags as you get them. Once the bag is full, tied closed and then put in your blue bin. Restart again with a new bag and fill up.
- 7. Prepare your recyclables the right way
 - a) Bundle your stretchy bags and wrap together into a single bag and securely tie closed.
 - b) Bag your shredded paper.
 - c) Put the rest of your recycling loose into your blue cart. Make sure your recyclables are not packed in too tightly or they will not fall out of the cart during pickup.
- 8. Download the Garbage Day App. Never miss a collection day by downloading the Garbage Day app onto your phone. View your schedule on-the-go and set notifications to remind you of your blue, black and green cart collection days.
- **9. Beyond the blue bin.** Some items can't be recycled or disposed of in any of the bins. This includes scrap metal, household chemicals and paint, used motor oil and clothing and textiles. The City offers drop-off programs for many of these items. Visit calgary.ca/whatgoeswhere to learn where to safely recycle or dispose of these items.

Recycle the right way

Bundle your stretchy plastic bags and wrap

Bag all your stretchy plastic bags and wrap into a single bag and securely tie closed. This includes grocery bags, produce bags, Ziploc bags and bread bags.



Keep the rest loose

Put the rest of your recycling in loose – all recyclables must be inside the blue cart for pickup. Do not use blue recycling bags or garbage bags.



- 10. Reduce, reuse, and rethink. When it comes to sustainability, reducing, reusing, and rethinking helps make an even bigger impact for the environment. Find ways to change your daily consumption of materials with these easy tricks:
- *Reduce* by saying no to single-use items like straws, plastic grocery bags and disposable coffee cups.
- *Reuse* by never leaving your house without your reusables like your water bottle, coffee cup, canvas shopping bag and cutlery set (e.g. fork, spoon, chopsticks, straw).
- Rethink by buying items in easily recyclable packaging like paper and cardboard or choosing better options like using Tupperware containers instead of plastic wrap.

REAL ESTATE COUNCIL OF ALBERTA

I recently found a house listed at a price that seems too good to be true. I discovered the house is a courtordered sale as the result of foreclosure proceedings. Are there any risks when buying a foreclosure?

Yes, there can be risks associated with buying a foreclosure property. Foreclosure properties may be offered at a lower than expected price, but you need to know what you're getting into.

A foreclosure sale, which may be labelled "as-is," "whereis" or judicial sale, is the sale of a property under the supervision of the Court of Queen's Bench. In a typical foreclosure sale, the owner of a property is behind on their mortgage payments and the lender requests that the Court order the home to be sold. The sale of the property is arranged through the courts in order for the lender to recoup the money owed to it.

In a foreclosure sale, there is no guarantee of the property's condition, no warranties, and a potential buyer can't submit an offer that is conditional on anything – such as a home inspection or financing. In some cases, when buying a foreclosure, you can't even see the inside of the property. This can create significant risk for a buyer.

In a foreclosure sale, the seller typically won't provide documents that are associated with the property, such as a Real Property Report and/or condominium documents. Without a Real Property Report, the buyer may not know the true location of the structures and the legal boundaries on the property. Likewise, without condominium documents, a buyer might not even know what the monthly condominium fees are. That being said, there are things you, as a buyer, can do to learn more about a property. Searching the address online may uncover something. Likewise, in the case of a condominium, you can find out the name of the condominium management company and pay to obtain condominium documents from the company rather than from the seller. But remember that any offer you make for the property cannot be conditional on receiving and/or reviewing those documents.

A court-ordered sale can be a very long process because it has to go through the Court. It's not as simple as a seller accepting or rejecting an offer from a buyer; the Court ultimately that makes those decisions. There's also the possibility that the sale could fall through at the last-minute in the event the property is no longer in foreclosure, for example if the owner gets caught up on mortgage payments. It is important to remember that nothing is guaranteed with a courtordered sale.

Even though foreclosures come with some risk, they can be a good option for some buyers – just make sure before proceeding you know the risks.

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TAKE ON WELLNESS

Depression isn't a one-size-fits-all diagnosis. From atypical depression to seasonal affective disorder, the condition has many faces.

Symptoms may include everything from hopelessness and fatigue to physical pain. And just as symptoms vary from person to person, so does the diagnosis.

We all feel sad at times. But depression is different. This serious mood disorder causes severe symptoms that affect how you feel, think, and manage your daily life, causing persistent feelings of sadness and loss of interest in previously enjoyed activities. The word depression is actually just an umbrella term for a number of different types of depression, from major depression to atypical depression to dysthymia. Depression ranges in seriousness from mild, temporary episodes of sadness to severe, persistent depression that seems as if it will never end. The clinical depression definition includes the more severe type of depression known as major depression (MDD).

The good news is that even if depression symptoms are severe, there is treatment. Medications and counseling can help to improve depression symptoms and give you your life back again.

Cannabis Edibles Aren't Risk-Free

Baked goods (e.g. cookies), beverages, and candies, including chocolates, soft-chews and mints, are the latest cannabis products to arrive in Alberta cannabis stores.

What do you need to be aware of if you're planning to use them?

If you are using cannabis, edible products provide an alternative to smoking.

Edible cannabis may affect you differently compared to smoked or vaped cannabis. Here are a few steps you can take to reduce your risks.

- First, consider the amount of THC in each product. Choose products that have 2.5 mg of THC or less, especially if you are a new or occasional cannabis user. This information can be found on the label.
- It can take up to four hours to feel the full effects of edible cannabis. Taking more within that time can increase the risk of adverse effects. Be patient, start low and go slow.
- Edibles may affect you for up to 12 and even 24 hours. Be aware that you may be impaired for a significant time.
- Avoid mixing cannabis with alcohol or other drugs, as mixing can significantly increase the risk of over-intoxication and impairment.
- · If you have existing health conditions or are on medi-

cations, talk to your pharmacist or doctor before using any type of cannabis.

- Make sure you are with people you trust, who can help you if you have unpleasant or unexpected results, and that you are in a familiar environment when you first eat cannabis.
- There is no known safe amount or form of cannabis to use while pregnant or breastfeeding. The chemicals in cannabis may affect your baby's brain development and may result in learning and behavioural issues that last throughout their life.
- Store cannabis products and other drugs (including alcohol, tobacco and tobacco-like products) in their original packaging, locked up and out of sight of children or pets.
- Edible cannabis products increase the risk of unintentional consumption and cannabis poisoning in children, as they may be mistaken for regular food or drinks. If a child is exposed to cannabis and shows signs of distress, contact Poison & Drug Information Service (PADIS) (toll-free 1-800-332-1414) or Health Link (call 811 or 1-866-408-5465 for Internet phone users).
- A bad reaction to cannabis may include a rapid heartbeat, anxiety, confusion, vomiting or more serious effects such as psychotic episodes or seizures. If you have these side effects, call your doctor or seek medical help.

S&S – Burns and Scalds

Each year, Emergency Medical Services respond to emergencies involving young children who have sustained severe burns or scalds. These incidents often occur inside the child's own home. Common causes include a child accidentally tipping hot liquids onto themselves, touching hot surfaces such as stoves, or making contact with electrical outlets. Fortunately, incidents such as these can be avoided by taking preventative measures.

Degrees of Burn

- 1°: Affects only the top layers of the skin; appears red like a sun burn; discomfort is generally tolerable;
- 2°: Deeper and much more painful than 1°burns; broken skin or blisters commonly develop;
- **3**°: Severe: the deepest layers of skin and tissue are injured; may appear charred or leathery.

First Aid for Burns

- Skin may continue to burn if not cooled. Immediately douse burns with large amounts of cold water.
- Cover the burn with a sterile dressing, or at least clean material to protect infection;
- Over the counter medications may be used for pain. Adhere to directions given on the label;
- Seek further medical attention, as required.

Prevention of Burns

- Check the temperature of your hot water tank. Temperatures as high as 60°C / 140°F will scald a child in just seconds;
- Use placemats instead of tablecloths. Tablecloths can be yanked downward causing hot drinks or food to spill on a child;
- Turn pot handles to the back of the stove and ensure cords from kettles, slow cookers, and other electrical appliances cannot be reached;
- Avoid picking up a child while holding any hot liquids;
- Ensure electrical outlets are made secure by installing commercially available safety devices which prohibit access;
- Keep children away from areas where appliances are in use (kettles, irons, hot stoves).

If you require immediate medical attention, call 9-1-1.
